Palm Beach Modern + Contemporary, presented by Art Miami, concluded its seventh edition on March 23rd, featuring 70 international galleries. Held at the Palm Beach Convention Center, the fair attracted seasoned art collectors and 'Next Gen' enthusiasts to the exclusive enclave of Palm Beach. With Palm Beach experiencing a remarkable 93% increase in millionaire residents over the past decade, the city solidifies its reputation as a haven for the affluent elite. Against this backdrop of prosperity, attendees indulged in investment-grade artworks from renowned contemporary, post-war, and modern masters, reaffirming the event's significance in the realm of art and wealth.

However, beyond the transactional side of the art market, the fundamental principle of why we collect art and place it in our most treasured personal spaces always shines through. Art transports us through a colorful dimension of time and place. From first glance, we travel to deep introspection and from darkness into light.

After all, humans are phototropic by nature.

While walking through the aisles of a spectacular exhibition of art in all mediums, the journey to different places is felt everywhere. However, today, we focused on light as a medium. These seven artists offered us, as the viewer, a chance to turn away from our natural perspective and get lost in the light.

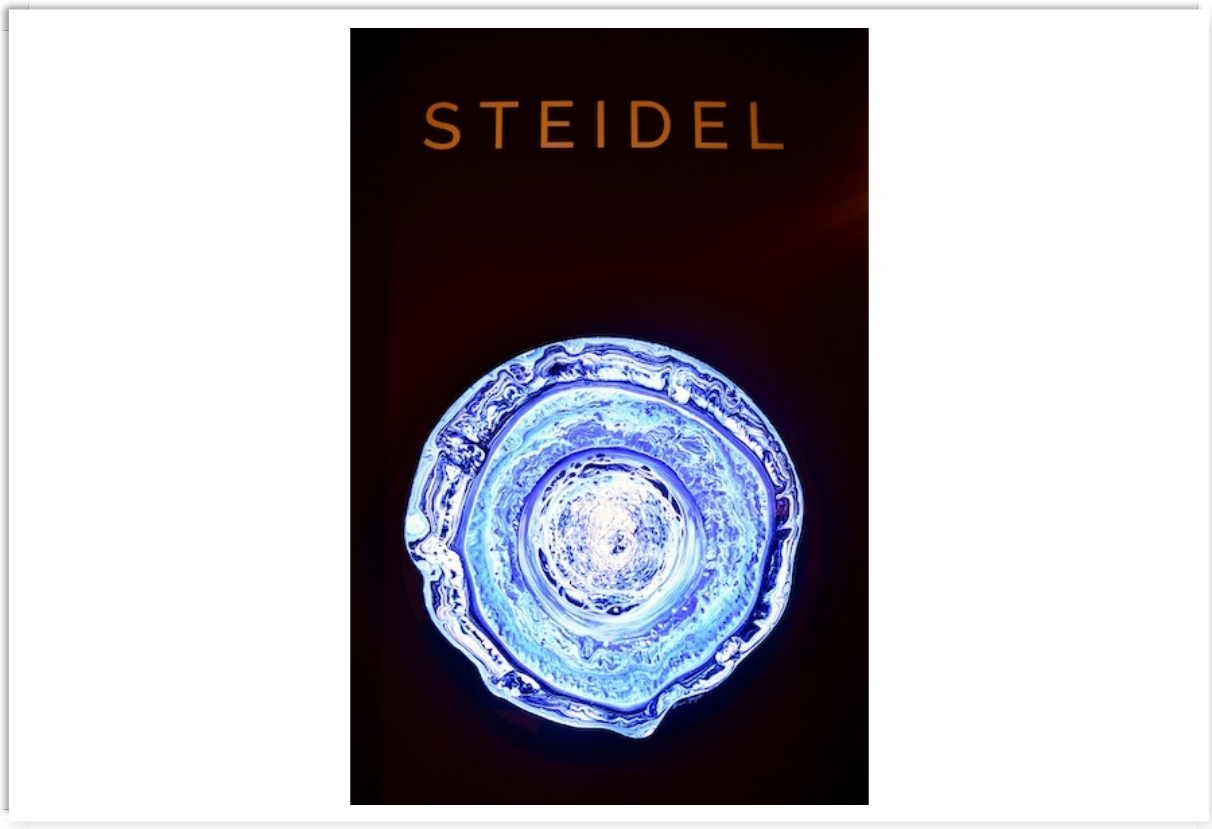

Pablo Arnesto, Maison d'Art (Monaco)

Pablo Arnesto's work is framed within an experimental space in which sculpture and painting coexist with the immaterial character of light and shadow, together with technology and science. The luminescence of his pieces is achieved through systems of LEDs, neons, cathodes, and fiber optics combined with wood and lacquered metals.

Erre Namyeter, Steidel Contemporary (Palm Beach)

Erre Namyeter uses the paint he creates on his own to make multiple layered abstract sculptures. Repetitive linear movement and the harmony between the colors are the most outstanding features in his works. Even though his patterns look as if they are randomly made at first glance, they are created after a very controlled process. Steidel Contemporary exhibited three of Namyeter's new works, with the stunning Oceanic 2024 taking center stage. The two other smaller works were equally compelling.

Julian Opie, Lisson Gallery (London, New York, Los Angeles, Shanghai, Beijing)

"Everything you see is a trick of light," says British artist [Julian Opie](#). "Light bouncing into your eye, light casting shadows, creating depth, shapes, colors... awareness allows us to look at looking and, by extension, look at ourselves and be aware of our presence." His LED works complement and give movement to his reductive style that evokes both a visual and spatial experience of the world around us.

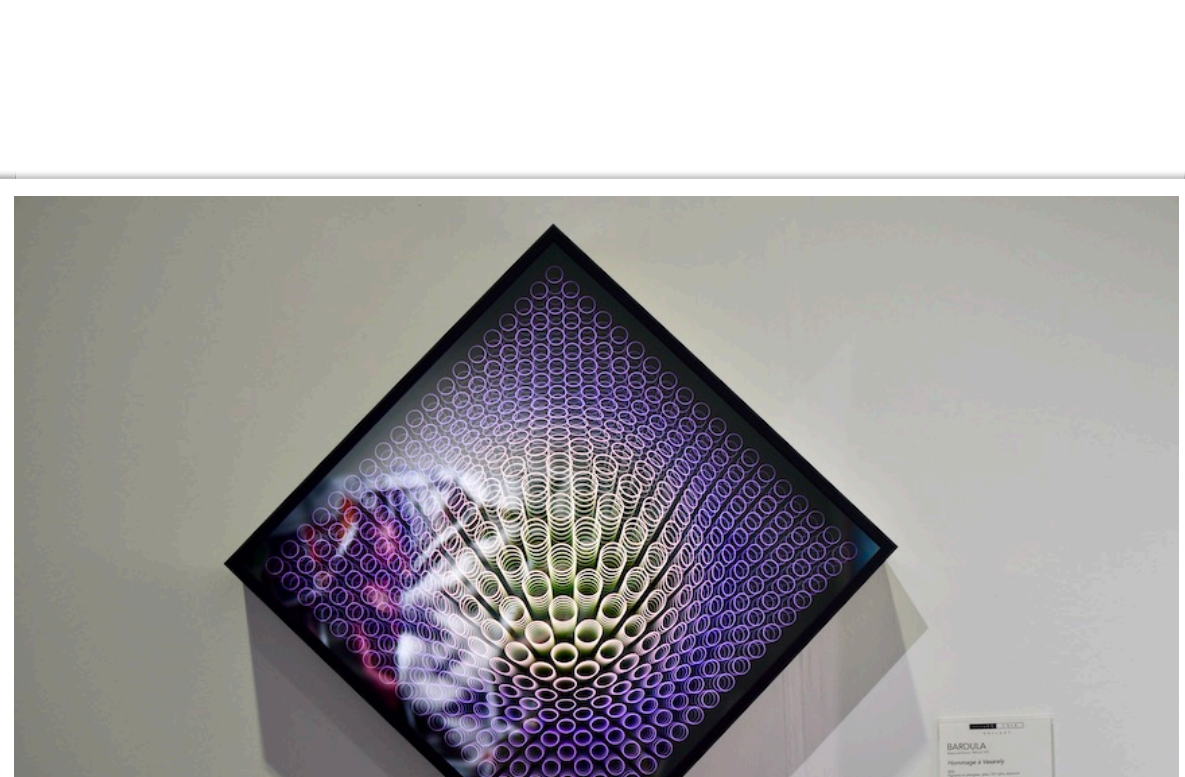
Amariist Studio and David Dessens, Priveekollektie Gallery (The Netherlands)

Amariist Studio's *Aqua Fossil Chandelier /r* transports the viewer to a landscape of unknown nature, where water has become fossilized. Alabaister is only composed of two molecules, H2O and CaSiO4, but the artists aim to describe a fluid organic composition presenting Alabaister Stone as a liquid element.

In an Instagram post, they remarked, "We sculpted in stone streams of water in translucent stone, imagining a future where water is in a fossil state. Aqua Fossil is reflecting on the scarcity of our natural resources and the need to protect them."

Inspired by the great French impressionist painter Claude Monet and his *Nymphéas* series, **David Dessens's** *Eternity Pond* presents a cross-section of the impressions that nature has left in him. *Eternity Pond* is a generative artwork in which programming and algorithms are used as artistic tools for the creation of every element and pattern. Viewers experience an interactive moving landscape where water lilies and leaves float on the water while fish swim, frogs jump from one leaf to the other, and dragonflies pass over the pond.

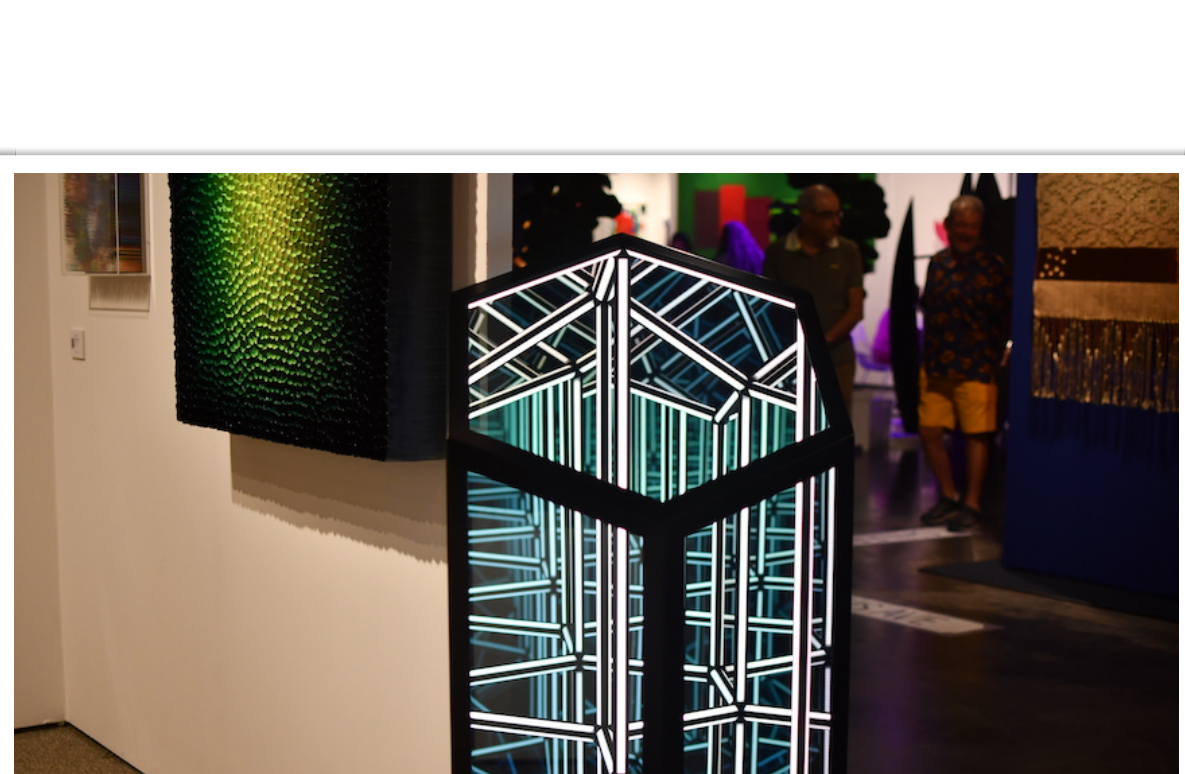

Bardula, Oliver Cole Gallery (Miami)

Bardula is an artist whose lumino-kinetic work is created by a couple, a Belgian silversmith and a French architect, in their studio south of Paris. Drawing on light, transparency, reflection, and virtual volume, they investigate optical effects on a geometrical basis and explore mathematical figures extracted from 3D digital models, and movements inspired by vortex phenomena. For *Homage to Vasarely*, the duo uses laser and LED technologies to pay tribute to [Victor Vasarely](#), recognized as the father of optical art.

Jason Sims, HOFA Gallery (London, Greece, California)

Jason Sims primarily works with light and reflection to create simple illusions of space in the form of contemporary sculpture, large-scale installation, and public art. Blurring the lines between reality and illusion, Sims' work defies notions of physical possibility.

He says, "We need physical space in order to sort out our internal space."

In conclusion, Palm Beach Modern + Contemporary illuminated the artistic landscape with a captivating exploration of light as a medium, featuring works by talented artists from around the globe. From Pablo Arnesto's innovative use of LEDs to Erre Namyeter's layered abstract sculptures, each piece offered a unique journey into the interplay of light and perception. As attendees wandered through the aisles of the fair, they were transported to new realms of introspection and wonder.

Looking ahead, anticipation mounts for the next installment of the Art Miami, set to take place from **December 3 to 8, 2024**. With each edition, the fairs continue to push the boundaries of artistic expression, promising yet another unforgettable celebration of creativity and innovation.

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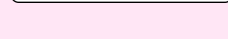
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
